. . . they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." (Matthew 1:23)

The deep meaning of the birth of Christ is contained in the name, Emmanuel (God is with us). It is a celebration of presence, of sharing our lives with God and one another. When we think of the Christmas season, we think of getting together with family and friends.

This year, there are three themes that will be woven together during the Christmas Season:

The Advent Sermon Series is titled, *Coming of the Light*. We will be reflecting on the Coming of the Light into the world as experienced in the birth of the Christ Child. Beginning with the prediction of the birth of John the Baptizer and continuing to the angles appearing to the shepherds, the four Sundays of Advent will lead us to the manger on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, Christmas Eve morning.

Please Note: During December there will be a Single 10:00 a.m. Worship Service in the sanctuary. Family Services will be held on the first three Sundays in December (12/3, 12/10, and 12/17).

2023 is the 250th Anniversary of the composing of the beloved hymn, Amazing Grace. During Lent, we did a sermon series on *Amazing Grace*. The Lenten devotional was based on this hymn. For Advent, our Advent devotional is also based on *Amazing Grace*. References to this devotional and the amazing grace of God's love for us in the birth of Jesus will be a theme in each sermon during Advent.

The third theme of this series is based on living a *happier* life. The four pillars of a happier life, *friends, family, faith, and purpose*, will be a part of each Advent sermon. The theme of living a happier life is about making intentional choices in our lives. As we draw to the close of the calendar year, we are also celebrating the beginning of the Christian Year with the First Sunday of Advent.

An important choice in our lives is the place of faith, worship, and our church community. How do you answer the question: What Does the Church Mean To Me? Is it an anchor in your life that gives you a deep confidence in God's love and the love of God's people? We use the phrases, church

family and *church friends*. What do these people mean to you? How important are these connections for your wellbeing?

A part of this answer involves the sustaining of your church, its ministry and mission, with your gifts, both your personal presence and contributions. As our Treasurer, Cal McRae, puts together the church budget for 2024, he asks if you ordinarily make an annual pledge and have not yet turned it in, it would be very helpful to him if you could do so before the end of December.

This Christmas Season is all about presence, being with one another and celebrating God's presence in our lives and the world. As you can see, the focus for this year is bringing us together to hear the amazing *Christmas Story* again and share it with each other. Please plan to participate in these wonderful opportunities!

For as long as I can remember, I've heard Christians talk about how much they love the Book of Psalms. I've heard how the beautiful poetry of this book of Hebrew scripture/song comforts and inspires. And while I was also able to appreciate the emotive words of the 23rd, 46th, and 100th Psalms, when I looked at many other psalms in this book, I found them less than inspiring. I often found I was confused or disturbed by the language the psalmist used. I can't tell you how many times I started reading a beautiful psalm and suddenly found myself facing words that seemed jarring. I'm not going to bore you with a comprehensive list of psalms I found less than comforting, but I'll give you a couple of examples. If you have a Bible close by, pick it up and look at Psalm 139. It is a beautiful psalm, and opens with language many of us have heard, "O LORD, you have searched me and know me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away." But when you get to verse 19 the mood shifts, and psalmist begs God to "...kill the wicked...and that the bloodthirsty would depart from me." There are other psalms that speak from the very depths of the troubled soul of the psalmist. In Psalm 44 we hear the psalmist crying out to God in deep lament, "Why do you forget our affliction and oppression? For we sink down to the dust; our bodies cling to the ground." As a result of the "dark" language I've found lurking throughout the psalms, I'll confess to you that, with a few exceptions, I've avoided them.

This semester in seminary I've been forced to take a new look at Psalms—and not just the "joyful" ones. The name of the class I'm taking is "Suffering, Lament, and Human Existence in the Hebrew Bible," which gives you some idea of the subject matter. We've discussed Job, Lamentations, and Psalms—specifically, the language in these books where we find sadness, anger, and other emotions most of us would like to avoid in our lives. But just like our ancestors did millennia ago, we find ourselves needing to express painful emotions because we experience pain. It might not be what we want to chat about over coffee with coworkers; it might not be what we want to post on Facebook or Instagram; it might not be what we want to think about when we're trying to fall asleep at night—but it is there. In many of the books of both the Old and New Testaments, we hear our ancestors turn that pain to God. We hear them ask, "why?" We hear them ask, "where are you God?" We hear them say, "I don't deserve this, God!" We hear them say what we may be thinking but are afraid to express out loud. We hear them talk about subjects we'd just as soon keep to ourselves.

Last week a classmate of mine, a United Church of Christ pastor, introduced me to a quote from my second favorite Presbyterian minister (after Vance, of course!), Fred Rogers. I grew up watching Mr. Rogers Neighborhood every weekday, and was delighted when I realized I had as much to learn from him as an adult as I did when I was a child. When considering the need to talk about the bad things, he said, "Anything that's human is mentionable, and anything that is mentionable can be more manageable. When we can talk about our feelings, they become less overwhelming, less upsetting, and less scary. The people we trust with that important talk can help us know that we are not alone." In the Book of Psalms, people talk about the entire range of emotions they're experiencing. They share their feeling, positive and negative, with God—and ultimately, with each of us. Over the semester I've come to believe that the passages that made me uncomfortable are there for a reason, and they have something to teach me—to teach us. That's one of the reasons I'm so excited that the 2024 Women's Evening Bible Study will be studying The Book of Psalms. I've found a wonderful book that will guide us through the individual psalms and help us connect what happened thousands of years ago to our 21st century lives. I'm eager to see what I've been missing in this ancient book. If you are a woman who is interested in participating, we are thrilled for you to join our group!
